



Dress Code

GOLF DRESS CODE (Applies to all areas of the golf course, range, and practice areas)

All members and their guests are to wear appropriate golf attire. Proper golf attire would be indicative of current golf trends and attire sold in the North Oaks Golf Club Golf Shop or other like clubs. Unacceptable golf attire shall be defined by the Golf Committee and enforced by the Golf Staff. Examples of unacceptable golf attire on the practice range, putting green and the golf course would include the following: super short shorts/mini-skirts, tennis shorts, cutoffs, gym shorts, sweats, blue jeans, ripped pants, tube tops, halters, tank tops, midriff baring shirts, and non-club style logoed hoodies, layering tops and/ or T-shirts. Shirts must be tucked in for men, and hats must be worn in a forward position.

CLUBHOUSE, PATIO & DINING AREAS DRESS CODE

Business or club casual attire (denim style jeans without holes), plus acceptable golf attire is recommended and acceptable in all dining areas. The Wine Room requires business casual dress at a minimum, no hats, except for women. Unacceptable articles of clothing for all areas include: super short shorts/mini-skirts, tennis shorts, cutoffs, gym shorts, sweats, ripped pants or shorts with holes, tube tops, halters, tank tops, midriff baring shirts, men's sleeveless shirts, and non-club styled logoed hoodies, layering tops and/or T-shirts (Note: Gameday gear for Minnesota athletic events and schools is deemed acceptable during or after games for juniors and adults alike). Men are requested to remove their hats inside the Clubhouse dining areas, but they will be accepted inside the Bar areas and must remain in the forward position. Special Note: Players coming from tennis/pickleball courts are reminded to clean up or change into appropriate attire.

The Board of Directors has tasked our Management team and Golf Professional staff to remind members and their guests of these policies. In the event someone does not abide by the policies they may be subject to appearing before the Golf or House Committee.
